# Headmaster's Report

The academic year 2019-2020 was not quite the year we expected.

We welcomed pupils in September and they embarked on their studies and activities with the usual enthusiasm. You will see in the following pages how much they achieved in terms of academic attainment, their work with the community and personal development in the first six months of the school year.

It has been truly heartening to produce this review of the year because it shows how much progress was made despite the best efforts of the Covid-19 virus which meant that most pupils were not in school from March 2020. Staff and pupils embraced technology to move teaching and activities online from March to July and I was delighted to see how well pupils adapted to the 'new normal'.

After the initial closure in March, we gradually brought back some pupils; those with parents who are key workers; those with difficult home circumstances; then those in Year 10 and Year 12 and those moving up to Year 7 the following year. In fact, the School remained open continuously from February to July, as some pupils remained with us through the Easter and May half term holidays too.



Simultaneously delivering lessons online and in person, as well as keeping some boarding houses open throughout the pandemic was a major undertaking. None of this could have been achieved without a committed staff who often went beyond the call of duty to give pupils the education and pastoral care they needed at a very worrying and uncertain time.

I hope you find this Annual Report uplifting – it shows the true Gatton spirit will triumph whatever the circumstances.

# STILL THE MOST SOUGHT-AFTER SCHOOL IN SURREY!

The Royal Alexandra and Albert School is the most sought-after secondary school in Surrey for the second year running. This is according to data from the Department of Education.

There were around six applications for each of the 74 Year 7 places in September 2020, with over 450 families naming the School as one of their preferences. 160 applicants named the Royal Alexandra and Albert School as their first choice – over 80% more than two years ago.

Headmaster Mark Dixon says "This year we have received more applications for Flexi Boarding and Full Boarding places than ever before. I am pleased so many families are choosing this school for their child. As a School we place great emphasis not only on supporting academic achievement, but also on providing fantastic pastoral care. We aim to offer opportunities for all children to flourish, whatever their background, abilities or interests."

## GCSE RESULTS DAY

After two years of hard work, and months of not seeing one another, Year 11 pupils were able to open their GCSE results in August. There were many relieved smiles and joyful moments throughout the morning as pupils celebrated a strong set of results.

The School is proud of pupils' hard work and their resilience throughout the year that led to so many individual success stories. This year's results saw the School's Progress 8 score (the Government's measure of academic progress) increase once again, meaning that a child, whatever their ability, made well above expected progress.

It was a very different A Level Results day, but one thing hadn't changed: the hard work and determination of pupils to achieve success.

After the disruption and cancellation of exams due to Covid-19, our Sixth Formers didn't really know what to expect when they came to collect their A Level results. For many students there was relief and joy as they opened their results.

Many students secured their first-choice university with places across various subjects, such as: Psychology, Aerospace Engineering, Medical Physics, Dentistry, Art and Performing Arts.

With regard to Russell Group, students went to destinations including Newcastle, Durham, Exeter, a number at UCL, Warwick, Edinburgh, York, Bristol and Birmingham. Approximately a third of all pupils who applied to University achieved a place at a Russell Group University.

Headmaster, Mark Dixon said "It has been a stressful six months for our Sixth Formers but I am pleased so many have achieved their goals. It has been great to welcome students back to school to collect their results, and to see so many happy and relieved faces."

# GROUND SOURCE HEATING SYSTEM

This year, work started on a major project that will see the School move towards installing renewable energy in all its buildings. The new Ground Source Heating system is believed to be the largest such project in the UK. Previously, the School and its boarding houses were all heated by oil, with 23 separate boiler rooms burning more than three quarters of a million litres of oil per year. The new scheme will draw heat from 2 lakes and some 170 bore holes driven into the chalk of the North Downs.

The project is costing over £5million to install which is funded by a 20-year green energy bank loan from Lloyds Bank which will be repaid from fuel savings, together with funding from the Government's Renewable Heat Initiative. In addition to the new heating system, all the boarding houses have had their insulation improved and the School is changing all its lighting over to LEDs to save energy. Within 20

years, the project will save 15 million litres of oil.

The first phase was made live on 10th March. As well as being cost-effective, the new Ground Source Heating system will mean the School no longer relies on 755,000 litres of oil each year to heat the School and boarding houses. The source of the energy is the bedrock beneath the school and lakes within the park.

Tony Samuels, Chairman of Surrey County Council, officially opened the first phase, in the presence of school staff, governors and members of the School's ECO Society.

# INTRODUCING MUSIC AND SPORTS SCHOLARSHIPS


Exciting developments and enhancements in the Music and Sport departments have propelled the School to launch new Music and Sports Scholarships for talented musicians and pupils with outstanding sporting ability.

The School recently appointed five specialist Heads of Sport to oversee the progression of pupils who excel in sport and the development of the School's five main sports: netball, swimming, cricket, football and rugby.

With the current piano stock being replaced with instruments from Steinway & Sons, all music scholars will receive tuition exclusively on Steinway pianos. Pupils will have access to the highest quality tuition as well as packed diary of performances, concerts, musicals, and music tours.

The introduction of the new Sports and Music Scholarships will see the most talented applicants given further opportunities to develop as sports or music specialists whilst they are pupils at the School.







The last financial year was unprecedented in the Foundation's history as the School's staff, Trustees and members of the Governing Body worked tirelessly to deal with the impact of the Coronavirus pandemic. The School was effectively closed from 23rd March 2020 to all but the children of key workers who could not be cared for at home and vulnerable children. and remained in this state until June when certain year groups were allowed to come back. During this time, we worked with our charity partners to provide support at home (providing laptops and food vouchers) for vulnerable pupils who did not stay at school during lockdown. The Foundation decided that fees for the Summer Term should be reduced by 50% in order to alleviate the financial strain on parents when many were being furloughed.

Despite the pandemic, we continued with some of our major infrastructure projects. Rank Weston House, our Junior boarding house, was refurbished at a cost of £1.25 million and work continued on our Ground Source Heating project.

We currently have 104 Foundationers, a record number. The Foundation has also been active in providing financial help to those parents who have been worst hit by the impact of the pandemic by establishing a scheme to help them through these difficult times.



# Easter Holiday Camp

After the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic, the School remained open for the children of key workers and those with difficult home circumstances. The need for them to stay in boarding didn't stop after the official end of term, so the School remained open right through the Easter holidays and May half term.

The Easter holiday camp was themed around Harry Potter and Alice in Wonderland. One of the highlights was Alice in Gattonland – a tough mudder chase through lakes and round the park, finishing with a waterslide from the Parterre down Gatton Killer. But all tastes were catered for with pompom animals, gardening, tea parties, robotics, and an Easter egg hunt.

We held another holiday camp in the May half term break, and this time we had a little more time to plan. We turned the Serpentine Woods into our own Forest School. We now have an outside classroom, reading rooms, bug hotels, a fairy garden, and a labyrinth, which can be used in the future

Throughout this, we used both school facilities and the Park. The Engine Pond and a new fleet of kayaks and our old rafts meant we really made the most of the sunny weather. Lockdown was difficult for everyone, but with our beautiful grounds, and the support of the School's Foundation, we provided our pupils with a fun environment during the holidays.

This allowed more key workers to focus on their jobs, and provided a stable home from home for children with difficult home circumstances







## COVID-19 HARDSHIP FUND

Covid-19 has had serious financial repercussions for many, and our parents were not immune. Along with the rest of the working population, our parents had to cope with furlough and redundancy. Being so close to Gatwick Airport we found that many of our parents were affected by the collapse of international travel. The 50% reduction in fees for the Summer Term did make a difference but for some, this was not enough.

We wanted to provide support to those families hit hard by this pandemic and alleviate the financial worries that can affect the whole family. We also wanted to ensure that every one of our pupils was able to remain at our school in an environment they know, and be able to remain close to their friends in these uncertain times.



Junior School Music Project

We have been successful again this year in securing grants for the Music Department. Last year we managed to secure grants to pay for a complete set of string and brass instruments as well as 15 extra woodwind instruments. We still needed to complete the set of woodwind instruments but in December we were delighted to receive an additional £1,900. This has enabled us to purchase the remaining instruments we needed.



The Music Department is now equipped for the Junior School Music Project, where every pupil in Year 4, 5 and 6 will receive two terms of instrumental lessons. Our juniors can now discover a passion for music by gaining hands-on experience with an instrument.

It has also meant that several of the Year 6s were able to join the beginners' orchestra which caters for the absolute beginner instrumentalists. Being able to teach these young musicians on orchestral instruments is not only a wonderful opportunity for them but it also offers us the ability to teach them how to read music in the most practical manner. They are learning the fundamentals of music whilst learning a brilliant life skill.

The department's ambition is for all our pupils to finish Year 6 being able to read music notation and to play an instrument. This additional grant has given us the ability to fulfil this ambition and it is fantastic that we can offer this to our pupils. We could only do it with our very generous supporters!





# Junior School

On 14th November the Junior School became Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry as pupils enjoyed a Harry Potter themed day of learning. One of the highlights of the day was the PAC full of children in robes eagerly awaiting the Sorting Hat's decision about their house.

With the sorting done, children rotated around the classrooms to experience different magical activities. Mrs Harvey and Miss Hill offered children the opportunity to buy some goodies from Diagon Alley, but they needed to convert their money first of course. The result was not only the highest point total that we have ever achieved, but we also won the 'Most Improved School' award based on our points total from the year before.

On Tuesday 4th February, the same team competed in the County Final event at Spectrum Leisure Centre in Guildford. The competition was tough and had increased dramatically from the previous event.

Despite this, the children embraced the occasion and competed to the best of their ability. As a team, RAAS finished in 9th place. Finishing as the 9th best team in all of Surrey is an amazing achievement!

We are immensely proud of this group of students as it is such a fantastic achievement for them to qualify for a County Final for the first time. The level of commitment and dedication that each and every one of them showed was amazing, as many gave up their lunch times to practise their changeovers and their turns.




The trip included a visit to Deltapark Neeltje Jans where pupils learned how the dams are created and the impact they have in protecting the landscape. Exploring the landscape really showed pupils how vulnerable the Netherlands are to floods.

The group cycled around De Hoge Veluwe National Park and carried out soil explorations. This was followed by a visit to the Oosterbrook War cemetery and a museum telling the story of the battle of Arnhem.

## **SORRENTO**

One of the highlights of the Year 9-13 trip to Sorrento was undoubtedly the Roman City of Herculaneum on the first day of the trip. It gave a glimpse into the lives of Romans before the town was buried in the ash released by the eruption of Vesuvius. Day 2 was packed with visits to Catacombs, a cathedral and Castel Nuovo, and two ice cream parlours. Vesuvius on day 3 was a challenging climb but worth it for the views and seeing all the different types of lava. The afternoon was spent looking around Pompeii. It was pizza making to start day 4 followed by a trip to the Torture Museum and one last stop for ice cream. This was a fantastic trip: we saw and learnt a lot.

# SENIOR SCHOOL



In November, a group of History GCSE students visited the First World War battlefields. Across the three days, they visited sites in and around Belgium and France.

The focus of the trip was to develop a greater knowledge of medicine on The Western Front, so students visited a range of sites including a British Army Advanced Dressing Station and a model dugout that contained a Dressing Station.

Students also visited the resting places and memorials of Gatton's Old Scholars who lost their lives in the war. We took part in the Last Post Service at The Menin Gate and laid wreaths there on behalf

of our Old Scholars at The Menin Gate (where two Old Scholars are remembered) and Thiepval Memorial (where seven Old Scholars are remembered).

Students commented that, "the trip was really enjoyable and put into perspective just how many people lost their lives during the war" and "it was really helpful to learn about the changes to medicine in the places where these changes actually happened".



## Lille Christmas Market

In December, some of our Year 9 French students visited the Christmas Market in Lille, which was a great opportunity to practise some French and immerse themselves in the French culture.

The Christmas Market of Lille was magical - with the wave of a magic wand, the city takes on a festive atmosphere and welcomes all to a winter wonderland! There were loads of chalets with gift ideas, nativity figurines, Christmas decorations and festive food. A great time was had by all.





## RECOGNISING HIGH PERFORMING PUPILS

In March, Mrs Mitchell (Deputy Head Academic) recognised the achievement of high-performing pupils who had gained more than 150 credits. Credits are awarded for excellent performance or behaviour. Each received a certificate and warm congratulations from staff and their peers in a special assembly.

First there was a talk in Chapel and then an opportunity to talk to the head of each subject option in Gatton Hall.



# SIXTH FORM



The Global Leader Award (GLA) was introduced in May 2018, and the first group of School's Sixth Form students to complete the programme received their awards at a special event in Gatton Hall in January.

Special guests at the dinner were Mr Bill Biddell, Vice Lord-Lieutenant of Surrey, and Mrs Bridget Biddell, High Sheriff of Surrey. Mr Biddell gave an inspirational speech about leadership, resilience and the importance of character. The Headmaster gave the evening's congratulatory speech to students.

The Global Leader Award has proved to be a popular and successful programme,

with students embracing the challenges that aim to make them well-rounded global citizens. In its first year, 87% of students in Year 13 successfully completed the programme, and 26 students received the top Platinum award, which required students to contribute at least an additional 210 hours of activities on top of their A Level work.





In 2014, Jacob Sayers completed his school education at the Royal Alexandra and Albert School and took up a place in the Medical School at University College London, having achieved three A\*s and an A in his A Levels.

In October, Jacob came back to meet members of the School's medical society MEDSOC to give a talk about his experience of applying for a place in medical school. He also talked about how he had progressed through medical school and embarked on a PhD, and how different medical schools have different specialisms. Jacob is continuing clinical medicine alongside his PhD.

One of the students who was at the talk was Zoe Thornton. Zoe joined the Sixth Form at the RAA in September having moved from a school in her home country of Barbados. She chose to come to a British school so she could make the transition to study medicine at a British university, and has set her sights on Oxford. Zoe said "The talk from Jacob was really informative. It was refreshing to hear about the application process from someone who had completed it recently. He gave us some good tips about choosing a medical school, for example, choosing one that is near a hospital."

## EXPANDING SIXTH FORM SUBJECT RANGE

In October 2019, we announced a new subject was to be added to the School's Sixth Form. From September 2020, Sixth Form curriculum students have been able to choose to follow a BTEC course in Media Production. We are pleased we can offer this subject which will equip students with the skills and knowledge they need to develop a career in this growing industry.

### PUBLIC SPEAKING MASTER CLASS

In preparation for the General Election, we welcomed the Shadow Leader of Croydon Council, Tim Pollard, to give Year 12 Politics students small group training sessions on public speaking. These students would be representing the five main parties in the School's own General Election. As an experienced public speaker, Mr Pollard helped pupils improve their delivery, speeches and overall public speaking technique. Students even filmed themselves to understand what they were doing well and what they could improve.

Following the announcement of the General Election, the Headmaster was keen for local parliamentary candidates from all the main parties to have the opportunity to engage with Senior pupils.

The School welcomed Susan Gregory, the Labour Candidate; John Vincent, from the Liberal Democrats; Jonathan Essex from the Green Party; and Crispin Blunt, the Conservative candidate and current sitting member of parliament for Reigate.

To coincide with the General Election, on Thursday 12th December, the School hosted its own election with pupils voting and standing as candidates.



# BRITISH FILM INSTITUTE & JOE CURRAN (Documentary Film Maker)

This year, Mr Brackpool and his Film Studies students went to the British Film Institute in London for a series of talks on representation in cinema.

There was also a visit from a guest speaker, Joe Curran. Joe is a documentary film maker and is currently making a documentary called 'A Story of Bones'. He spoke about the trials and tribulations of filmmaking as well as giving students an insight into documentary making. The students enjoyed asking him lots of questions and learning about the film industry.

## MASTERCLASS TASTER IN STEINWAY HALL

The School will be joining an elite group of 25 private schools in England that use exclusively Steinway pianos for music tuition. This special status means the School will take delivery of eight new pianos from the world-renowned piano makers, replacing its current stock of uprights and baby grands.

We have recently been making a concerted effort to develop our performance programme in Drama in an attempt to reflect the outstanding talent many of our students have as both actors and singers. We have therefore produced a number of productions, some smaller in scale with the intention of leading us into a major production working with the Music Department.

In October 2019, we staged the musical 'Cabaret'. This was the first major production the School had staged in many years being a full-scale musical and obviously requiring a great deal of time and effort of all those involved. Auditions took place in January 2019 with rehearsals kicking in a month later. Though directed by Mr Christian Jones, the success of the production was as a result of a truly a team effort,

with Mr Adam Shea serving as Assistant Director, Ms Kerstin Dixon choreographing the show and Mr Lewis Edney and Mr Jamie Millburn serving as Musical Directors.

Performances took place over three nights and culminated in a 'Gala Dinner' performance on Saturday 19th October in which the audience were served a three-course meal before the show itself.

In November, Year 7 students staged a comedic interpretation of 'Hamlet' as part of the national Shakespeare Festival. The performance itself was staged at the Leatherhead Theatre and proved resoundingly popular with audiences.


## THE POWER OF MUSIC

# QUARANTINE FOR OVERSEAS PUPILS RETURNING IN SEPTEMBER

When the Government introduced its quarantine policy for people arriving in the UK, we recognised some of our overseas families might struggle to make arrangements for two weeks quarantine prior to the start of the new term in September. We therefore set about arranging for pupils to quarantine at School before the start of term.

For two weeks in August, Gatton Hall, which is usually a Sixth Form boarding house, was converted to a quarantine boarding house. With one floor for boys and another for girls, and shared common rooms, the house was perfect for the job. Special arrangements were made for food to be cooked and delivered for pupils to eat in the downstairs state rooms.

Around 50 pupils from around the globe including Spain, Romania, USA, Moldova, Uganda and The Netherlands signed up so they could come back to School at the start of term

Pupils participated in activities consisting of both indoor and outdoor sports, games, walks around the grounds and arts and crafts. Each day pupils had quiet time and in the evenings there were movie nights, quizzes, games nights and a BBQ.

## YEAR 6 RETURN TO SCHOOL

As lockdown gradually eased, in June, Year 6 came back to School. In socially distanced classrooms, and in groups of no more than 15, pupils were delighted to be able to come back for face-to-face lessons with their classmates.




## YEAR 10 AND YEAR 12 RETURN

## **GATTON TRUST**

The Gatton Trust's role is to restore the parkland and gardens of Gatton Park and to encourage the local community to visit for leisure and learning. This year all of the work was significantly affected by the Covid-19 crisis.

Volunteers are at the core of the work of the Trust, assisting with every aspect of our operations. Approximately 90 people support the Trust's work in some way. When the national lockdown was announced, our volunteer teams were unable to come to the park and this left a skeleton staff to maintain our 260 acre site, until their return in the summer.

In the height of the growing season, the volunteers who were safe to return took up the challenge and made up for lost time. Although some of our projects have been delayed, the 'Capability' Brown landscape and Edwardian gardens are looking in great shape.

The Japanese Garden has been the focus of a project, supported by Postcode Local Trust. The teahouse roof thatch has been replaced by cedar shingles and access works including steps and a path will be put in place.

A new restoration project has also started. Amongst the trees near our Pleasure Gardens, there lies a garden which has been largely undisturbed for 80 years. The Old World Garden is thought to be named after the Old World roses which surrounded the rectangular pool, within a yew hedge. All that remains is a pond and some very tall yew trees which have grown up from the original hedge.

This year, work started to cut these trees back, to encourage new growth and to bring the hedge back to life. Further pruning and planting will be required before work starts on the garden itself.

Our busy summer season of events, school visits and activities for families was limited this year but during the winter our intrepid Forest School families enjoyed the activities (and the mud!) down in the woods. We also ran a project for local families who are supported by the Red Oak Family Centre, so that they could experience Forest School too.

## SNOWDROP SEASON

In February each year residents, pupils and visitors to Gatton Park enjoy the spectacle of blankets of snowdrops around the park and especially the Rock Garden.
