

The referendum is over, but the question mark remains. We are left with instability and confusion. It is some time since UK social consciousness received so great a shock. This could yet prove beneficial. I am not an unqualified supporter of the EU. An outrageously wasteful administration, absurd monthly relocations of the seat of power, a cemetery of unproductive politicians, rewarded with six figure salaries and

pensions. It would be a plus if a little EU reflection now caused some self-assessment of this.

Instability. Consider the week. As most who voted 'remain' predicted, an array of crucial industrial and financial figures have pulled back. The Bank of England prophesies caution. Nothing new there, perhaps. And yet... Both political parties are in turmoil, obsessed with ego, oblivious to what antics do to economics. Personal and public treacheries, renewed political baloney and posing. Politics not of communal responsibility, but personal lusts for power. And yet... some EU authorities, initially enraged, already softening and slightly conciliatory toward the betrayer. Markets, fickle as ever, swinging back approaching last week's levels. We see just how vulnerable money is to the intangible, to matters utterly uneconomic, to chemistry, ethos, international and national mood. Do not ask economists for help at these times. They do not know.

Travelling back from London Victoria this week, a chaos of cancellations, universally attributed to 'a shortage of train crew'. I walked twelve coaches to the front of the Three Bridges service, and sat inside for half an hour. The train was cancelled, and 1500 passengers disgorged back to the platform with thousands of others. Staff conversations constantly overheard show that 'shortage of train crew' means (a) managers who are too short sighted or disorganised to provide staff, and (b) qualified staff too lazy to come to work. Outside, a major concourse review, needed for vast movement of buses, taxis and private cars, is unfinished after six years. Day in and day out, the site is abandoned. In other capitals, such a project would have been over in eighteen months. Transport infrastructure is a good litmus test for the level of priorities and focus beneath the national veneer.

At these times, a personal core of known and espoused universal values, ability to be silent, genuine concern for others, optimism and humour are paramount. Otherwise we make the mistake of thinking it is external events which are important. We need the politicians who show a glimmer of such awareness. It's called 'spiritual'.

Pupils from RAAS will be performing between 3:00 and 4:00 pm at the Gatton Fair, which is taking place on Sunday 3rd July.


Learning an instrument - Junior Group Lessons:

Recently all year 7 have an opportunity to work on their own games using Kodu. They have enjoyed the experience so I have decided to take the project further. From September I will be running a 4-5 club in ICT1 (day to be confirmed) to prepare for the Kodu Kup 2017 competition. The club is open for all ages.

The Kodu Kup is open to any child enrolled as attending a UK school and who are aged between seven to fourteen years of age at the date of

entry. You will be entered by me and you must be entered for the competition as a team of three people.

Please note, children cannot enter themselves and must, therefore, be entered by their teacher as both the Kodu Game Lab and PiL Network are subject to age restrictions.



You not only have to create a great game, but develop a business plan for a game franchise and create and produce a least one single piece of merchandise that promotes their game.

You need to market your game and try to get as many downloads as you

can of you game from the Kodu Gamelab site. You should try and get customer feedback and show how you have responded to this in your business plan.

You should include a photo of at least one single piece of promotional merchandise. (You can make as many as they like). This could be a badge, t-shirt, something you have knitted, cupcakes or even something 3D printed. Be imaginative and creative!

You may also want to include any promotional media you have created. Flyers, posters, radio and video adverts. It's totally in your hands.

Finally it was the 5 hour journey from Fishbourne back to school. We had so much fun - what a great week!


